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INTRODUCTIONS

BACKGROUND

GEORGIA ACCOUNTABILITY COURTS

- Specialized docket
- Designed to address specific issues or populations within the criminal justice system
- Alternative approach to traditional criminal court proceedings
- Focus on rehabilitation, treatment, and underlying issues that contribute to criminal behavior
- Evidence-based
- Participants assessed based on their risk and criminogenic need

- The primary goals of accountability courts are to:
 - 1. Divert individuals away from the traditional criminal justice system.
 - 2. Address the underlying substance use and mental health needs.
 - 3. Reduce recidivism.
 - 4. Promote community safety.

Key features of accountability courts may include:

- Treatment-centered approach
- Collaboration between the criminal justice system, mental health professionals, and social service agencies
- Regular court appearances with judges
- Individualized treatment plans
- Frequent monitoring and supervision
- Graduated sanctions
- Linkages to community resources and support services

EMPLOYMENT STANDARDS AND OUTCOMES

GEORGIA ACCOUNTABILITY COURTS Gainful employment is generally a requirement for most accountability courts. If a participant is assessed as employable, then it is expected that they work during program participation. Ineligible participants are defined as those with a disability that prevent them from working.

One of the primary ancillary services provided to participants is employment counseling and assistance. Case managers often connect participants with potential employers and assist with resume writing, job interview preparation, vocation training, social security/disability assistance, and more. CACJ collects statewide performance measures, to include employment and income at program entry and exit. It is expected that employment status and income increase during program participation. **EMPLOYMENT**



Diversion Savings per Dollar Invested






EMPLOYMENT STATUS

53% of the eligible participants work full-time




INCOME LEVEL




67% of participants have any income

ECONOMIC IMPACT




Each graduate produces

SUPERVISION REQUIREMENTS

GEORGIA ACCOUNTABILITY COURTS

- Not everyone is eligible for treatment court programs. Participants typically need to
 - Meet certain eligibility criteria
- Criminal history
 - Drug offenses and drug-motivated crimes, like theft
- Comprehensive clinical assessment
 - Treatment plan
 - Substance abuse treatment, mental health counseling, medication-assisted treatment, or other services

Supervision requirements include:

- Regular court appearances
- Random, frequent drug testing
- Home visits
